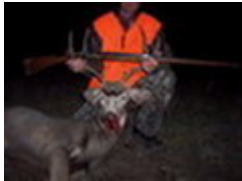

It might do well to put all this 70 grains 270 PB into perspective. First it see LaneNebraska is using a .45 cal. So first off comparing it to a 70 grain char just isn't fair. First, lets convert the 70 grains to an equivalent in .50 cal. J the percentage increase in bore area. $24\% \times 70 = 16.8$. Add that to 70 gr 87 grains of JSG. Doesn't JSG perform like 777 3f? If so lets multiply that fact 777 should be reduced by 15%) and get 100 grains. Now lets convert multiply 100 grains by 110%. We get 110 grains. So to get the same veloc bullet of the same sectional density, one needs in the neighborhood of 110 BP.

Your right, except the copper .45's also come in 275 grains. I confused the JSG in 50 cal. would be like 90 grains RS for muzzle velocity. I can see the 40 yards, especially high on the back like that where the ribs are thicker an more meat on them.

I just wouldn't want someone to take from the "second round" that 70 grain would produce identical results. I really don't think they would.

Can't believe that you feel this way. If you hunt where there is any cover a hole in and a hole out. If you don't you will probably not have a good blood find your deer. M/Lers are different from high powered rifles in that more o deer do run off. That is fine, no problem at all. You double lung a deer and usually within 100 yards. If I shoot one and don't get a passthrough, I will why, but not loose sleep over it. But, my goal is to have good bullet expan: complete passthrough.

This, is a part of your problem. Don't aim for the shoulder. Shoot your ML& aim behind the shoulder. You will take out both lungs and possibly the top have, and still do, take shots other than behind the shoulder. But, it is a ca am comfortable w/ the shockwaves to know that I can bust through both sh spine and I will still get a passthrough. I would love to see you hit the sam 245 grain pb. The difference between it and the plains bullet is that insteac mushroomed bullet in the other shoulder, you would have 500 little pieces c

Whats a 50 cal bullet of the same sectional density as a 270 .45cal bullet? Around 335 grains. So a 338 platinum PB with 110 grains of RS is equivalent in muzzle velocity to 270 PB with 70 grains JSG. If 110 grains is driving a 338 too fast in a 50 cal. then 70 grains of JSG is driving a 270 too fast in a .45 cal. I'll let everyone be their own judge

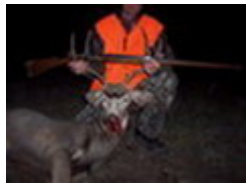
